## Special Monthly Compensation (SMC)

- SMC rates are for especially serious disabilities.
- SMC rates are tied to categories in 38 USC § 1114¹:
  - SMC(I) to SMC(p) cover specific disabilities
  - SMC(r) to SMC(s) cover specific needs for care
- These rates are paid instead of standard VA disability rates (except for SMC(k), which is paid in addition).
- To qualify under any category, a condition must be service-connected.

- SMC is an inherent part of an increased rating claim. A claim for SMC can be "part and parcel" of a claim for an increased rating.
- The Veteran is presumed to be seeking the maximum benefit possible unless there is an expressed satisfaction at or desire for a lower level of benefits.<sup>1</sup>
- Therefore, SMC should be considered anytime the Veteran is seeking increased benefits.<sup>2</sup>

## SMC and Lay Evidence

- Some levels of SMC can be established through lay evidence.
- Other levels of SMC can only be established through medical evidence.
- Always think about the evidence you need to submit to win the Veteran's claim.

### Anatomical Loss/Loss of Use: SMC (k)

- SMC(k) is for Veterans who have suffered the anatomical loss or loss of use of limbs or body parts.
- Loss or loss of use of creative organs (penis, testicles, ovaries): typically granted for erectile dysfunction.
- For women, loss of 25% of breast tissue, of one breast or both in combination.
- Others: loss of one foot, one hand, both buttocks, blindness in one eye, deafness in both ears, complete organic aphonia.
- Paid in addition to normal monthly rate.
- Schedular Eligibility Requirement: None

# Aid & Attendance: SMC (l)<sup>1</sup>

- SMC(I) is for Veterans who need regular aid and attendance.
- The need only has to be regular, not constant.
- The need must be caused solely by serviceconnected disabilities.
- Schedular Eligibility Requirement: None

### Eligibility for Aid & Attendance

#### Factors in determining eligibility for A&A1:

- An inability to dress or undress oneself
- An inability to keep oneself ordinarily clean and presentable
- A need to frequently adjust prosthetics or appliances which cannot be accomplished without aid. This does not include things you would not have been able to do alone, such as laces in back.
- An inability to feed oneself due to a loss of coordination or extreme weakness
- An inability to "attend to the wants of nature." This includes urination or defecation and cleanup.
- An inability to protect oneself from the hazards and dangers of daily life and environment. The inability can be physical or mental.

# Permanently Bedridden: SMC (l)

- SMC (I) is also assigned for being permanently bedridden.
- SMC(I) is reduced to SMC(s) when a Veteran is hospitalized.<sup>1</sup>

## Special Aid & Attendance: SMC (r)

- SMC(r) is for Veterans with a combination of severe disabilities.
- Must require daily help.
- Two types of SMR(r):
  - r1 Special A&A
    - Help can come from family or friend.
  - r2 Higher Level of A&A
    - Help must come from licensed medical professional.
    - Professional care must be needed to avoid hospitalization or institutionalization.

## Eligibility for SMC (r)

- To receive SMC(r), Veteran must meet conditions for disability and for level of care.
  - For r1 Special Aid & Assistance:
    - Must be entitled to SMC(o) or SMC(n)1/2+SMC(k)
    - Must require daily help
  - For r2 Higher Level of Care:
    - Must be entitled to SMC(o), SMC(n)1/2+SMC(k), or SMC(r)
    - Must require daily professional help

## Housebound: SMC (s)

- SMC(s) is for housebound Veterans.
- Two types:
  - Statutory Housebound
  - Housebound in Fact
- Both types require a single disability rated at 100%.
  - A TDIU rating based on a single disability may satisfy the statutory requirements of a 100% total rating.
  - A Veteran with a combined 100% rating may ask for a determination of whether a single disability merits a TDIU rating.<sup>1</sup>

Housebound: SMC (s)

70% for PTSD

diabetes, and shoulder disability

70% for diabete and diabetic neuropathies

**TDIU**

Counts as single 100% rated disability

Does <u>not</u> count as single 100% rated disability

YES, because the disabilities stem from the same cause (diabetes)

## Statutory Housebound: SMC (s)

#### Statutory Housebound SMC(s):

- Requires a single disability rated at 100%
   AND
- Requires a second disability rated at 60% or more
   OR
- A combination of <u>additional disability</u> ratings that total to 60% or more.
- The Veteran does not have to be medically housebound.

TDIU: Total Disability Based on Individual Unemployability

## Housebound in Fact: SMC (s)

#### Housebound in Fact SMC(s):

- Requires a <u>single disability</u> rated at 100%
   AND
- Requires that the Veteran's access to the outside world be highly limited because of service-connected disabilities, either mental or physical.
  - Veteran is <u>permanently confined</u> to the place of residence or immediate premises.
  - If institutionalized, Veteran is confined to ward or clinic areas.
